THE PLEASURE OF THE TEXT 25.03.2022 – 18.09.2022

The Museum of Fine Arts Le Locle (MBAL) is delighted to present the group show *The Pleasure of Text*, bringing together the creations of more than thirty Swiss and international artists on the relationship between images and words in art. The project is in line with the MBAL's policy, which aims to question societal issues by creating a dialogue between the masterpieces of the permanent collection and more contemporary creations. Faced with the continuous flow of images in our daily lives, are words doomed to disappear? What place does the emerging digital society have in store for them? The itinerary imagined by Federica Chiocchetti, director of the museum, reaffirms the strength and importance of writing in our lives. This rich and playful exhibition invites spectators – adults and children alike – to explore their imagination and rediscover the meaning and magic of the word.

The title, inspired by Roland Barthes' book of the same name (1973), suggests an intimate and visceral exploration of our relationship to words.

The exhibition begins with the theme of the pleasure of reading and writing, with the exhilarating frenzy of the imaginary library of the Swiss duo Lutz & Guggisberg. It continues with a dialogue between paintings and drawings from the MBAL collection, and projects by invited contemporary artists photographers mostly representing women reading. The collection of captivating vernacular and vintage photographs from Sara Knelman's *Lady Readers* project, the video by Melissa Catanese based on her book *Voyagers*, and the iconic shot by the English Jo Spence where the artist stages herself as a worker reading, hilarious and perplexed, *On Sexuality* by Sigmund Freud, echo to classical representations. Other memorial objects join along this journey through imagination, including a book gathering visuals of the

Simpsons characters reading. From the eighteenth century to the present day, from painting to moving images, the artworks presented attempt to unravel the unfathomable mystery of readers' thought. This first chapter closes with a masterful drawing by Pierre Bonnard representing a woman writing, evoking the notion of an act of liberation and knowledge, operating as a transition to the language games in the rest of the exhibition.

The journey into the pleasures of language continues with a slow and gradual verbal invasion of the image. The poem breaks free from conventions in the room dedicated to concrete and visual poetry. Guest curator Alex Balgiu, author of Women in Concrete Poetry: 1959-1979 (2020), presents a series of works from this artistic movement that experiences writing made of matter and time, body and space. The endless possibilities offered by the typewriter are explored by the artists Lenora de Barros, Françoise Mairey and Carla Demierre, from its carnal physicality to its graphic potentials and its games of repetition. The photographed performance of Ketty La Rocca lying in bed with a giant sculpture of the letter "J" maliciously questions the meaning of the I [je] and the game [jeu]. Mirella Bentivoglio gardens a book with plants. Elisabeth Lebon uses the dimensions and properties of paper to create small books akin to portable performances. A play of blanks, letters and punctuation animate the pages of Suzanne Bernard, a figure of French Lettrism, with sublime graphics.



The imaginary world of the algorithm is invited into the photographic practice of Nelis Franken. In his project *Perfect Forest*, the artist chose to accompany his series of urban images with texts created by an artificial intelligence based on a few keywords. The combination of aphorisms and images re-enchants the visual universe through a poetic narrative about the city.

Slogans and signs in the urban space inhabit the reflections of Luca Massaro, Nora Turato and Philippe Decrauzat. The textual traces of the city are listed by Massaro in an encyclopaedic project ranging from photography to sculpture. With a devastating sense of humour, Nora Turato diverts slogans in her graphic creations. Philippe Decrauzat deploys his geometric wall sculptures that retrace and reinterpret the graphic orthogonal lines of books, playing with the orientation of reading in the illusion of an editorial layout.

The MBAL inaugurates a new permanent space dedicated to children in which exhibitions, workshops and meetings will take place on a regular basis. Federica Chiocchetti asked artist Anne Turyn to dress up the room with her photographic project *Lessons & Notes*, featuring children in a classroom. For the exhibition, the walls transformed into blackboards will allow the youngest to learn and explore their creativity.

The experience ends with the pleasure of reading the landscape with Chloe Dewe Mathews' project conceived during her residency at the Verbier 3-D Foundation in 2016 and presented at the MBAL as part of the Alt+1000 festival. Inspired by Marey Shelly's 1816 trip to the same region, where the writer was stranded by weather conditions during that "year without a summer" and during which she conceived the first manuscript of Frankenstein (1818), the photographic series *In Search* of *Frankenstein* juxtaposes snow-capped mountains with a network of strange underground bunkers built in the 1960s to shelter the entire Swiss population in the event of a nuclear disaster. Dewe Mathews photographed the area that inspired the eighteen-year-old author, exploring miles of underground corridors and vast melting glaciers that seem to offer parallels between Shelley's prophetic socioenvironmental concerns and the anxieties of our time.

While Philippe Decrauzat's parentheses punctuate the exhibition spaces, each room in the museum is animated by textual, visual and typographical games, including the facade with *Title Tourist/Yellow Pages*, an installation by Triin Tamm and Rollo Press.


